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






Causality and Karma · Karma is an instance of the general law of causality Karma enters the picture when our feelings become involved



Why is Understanding Karma So Important?

- 1. It explains how experiences of pain and suffering arise as a result of negative actions, thoughts, and behaviour
- 2. It also explains how desirable experiences of happiness and joy arise as a result positive actions, emotions and thoughts
- 3. Our experiences come from causes and conditions which correspond to their result

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Karma is created in dependence on delusion as either:

1. The karma of intention

A mental factor conceiving an action




2. The intended karmas The mental factor generated at the time of actually performing an action of body or speech



Causation


- 1. Effects arise from causes and cannot arise without causes
- 2. Causes are impermanent
- 3. Effects must be concordant with their causes






Defining Substantial Cause

That which primarily produces the essential nature of its effect as opposed to the attributes of the effect




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Defining Cooperative Causes


That which primarily produces the attributes as opposed to the essential nature of the effect



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Causes And Conditions THE EXAMPLE The effects arising from the cooperative causes reside together with them, just like fire and molten copper. THE ANALOGY




